BEHIND YOUR HEALTH

Medical scientists are "rediscovering" the pig. Centuries ago pigs were used to map the circulatory and nervous systems of mammals, but in more recent times investigators seemed to lose interest in the animal.

Such a marked similarity exists between man and pig that miniature pigs, especially bred to weigh about the same as an average man, are among the most sought after research animals.

Pigs are used to set dietary standards for infants. A diet sustaining healthy growth of the pig—which matures rapidly and has similar but more stringent nutritional needs than a human infant—is likely to be more than adequate for the growth of a human baby.

Pigs are also used to study cardiovascular disease. Like man they develop atherosclerosis spontaneously. Recently scientists have found that high cholesterol diets fed to swine accelerate the development of the disease.

In a related area, pigs are being employed increasingly in surgical research involving the heart and blood circulation. Heart valves from pigs have actually been transplanted into humans.

Swine are even useful in dental research. Their teeth are only slightly larger than ours, and they also get "baby teeth" which make them a valuable model for the study of children's dental problems.

Similarities between man and pig are leading a number of scientists to conclude that the key to understanding a variety of human ailments may lie in studying the "mini pig."

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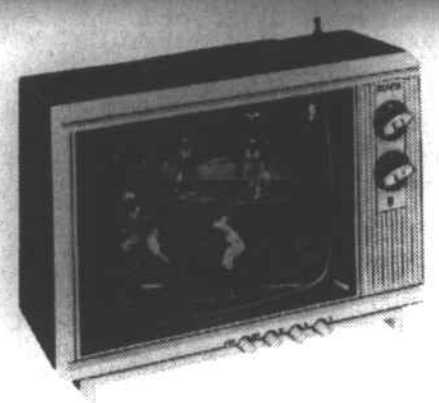

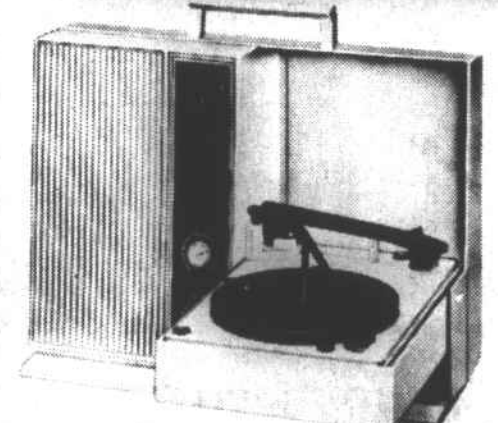
