



As a part of special training in Arson, the volunteer firemen of Duplin County investigated motives and different types of fires at a special instruction course at James Sprunt



The Duplin County Firemen's Association, represented by virtually every volunteer department in the county participated in a special training and arson detection seminar held re-

cently at James Sprunt Institute. Firemen were taught chemical composition as well as conventional fire fighting methods.

Arson Detection Course

A recent course of instruction provided by James Sprunt Institute afforded volunteer firemen from all parts of Duplin County special training in arson detection. The able instruction team of Calvin Beck and Marvin Sawyer guided these firemen through an investigation of possible motives which may be prevalent for different types of fires.

Further meaningfulness was added to this course by the study and examination of many different arson devices in common use today. The fireman were taught both the chemical composition and demonstrated effects of such devices.

This outstanding series of cl-

asses was climaxed by the planting of many devices in an abandoned house. Firemen were then taken into the house in small groups by the instructors to view the arson devices. A fire was then set to expose these devices to a stimulated arson situation.

Attendance for the entire series of classes was excellent. Many individuals other than firemen attended the last class to view the house burning, among which was Dr. Dallas Herring, chairman of the State Board of Education, and Mr. Keith Phillippe from the Department of Community Colleges in Raleigh, North Carolina.

Miss Maxwell Duplin Native Dies

Miss Myra Maxwell, 69, assistant director of nursing education of the Wilson School of Nursing from its founding in 1961 until 1968, died early this morning at her home at 208 W. Vance St.

Funeral services were conducted at 11 a.m. Thursday at Joyner's Funeral Home by Revs. Lawrence Avent and Kyle Magel. Graveside services were held at 3 p.m. Thursday at the Universalist Church Cemetery at Outlaw in Duplin County.

She was the recipient of numerous Wilson civic awards including Altrusa of the Year, May 1953; Exchange Club Citizen of the Year Award; and the Sertoma Service to Mankind Award, Feb., 1968. She was presented the Book of Golden Deeds by the Wilson Exchange Club in 1969.

A native of Duplin County, Miss Maxwell graduated from Seven Springs High School and was a teacher in Wilson and Wayne County schools. Around 1922 she became interested in nursing and graduated from the Carolina School of Nursing and attended Duke Hospital for further training. She returned to Wilson in 1935 to become head of the Carolina General Hospital School of Nursing.

While serving at the Carolina General School, Miss Maxwell was graduated magna cum laude from Atlantic Christian College and served as secretary to the North Carolina Nursing Association. She also held a teaching position at Dorothea Dix Hospital in Raleigh.
