Farmers Home Administration Program in S. E. N. C.

Mr. James T. Johnson, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration in North Carolina, and members of his staff met with the agency's County Supervisors and County Office Clerks from ten of the southeastern counties of the State in Whiteville, North Carolina, on July 10, 1969. The purpose of this meeting was to discuss with the County Office Staff means of providing the best farm management advice in harvesting and marketing crops for the remainder of this crop year. The group was also given advice on how best to assist with financial management the rural non-farm as well as farm families with whom the agency works.

The group was informed of assistance available through Farmers Home Administration including the Emergency Loan Program to help farmers who have suffered substantial production losses recently due to extreme weather conditions such as excessive rainfalls, hail storms, and tornadoes.

Mr. Johnson suggested that any farmers who have suffered such losses and cannot get their credit needs met adequately and satisfactorily from other sources may contact the Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor in the county in which they reside for more details.

A study was made of the agricultural income for the 1967 and 1968 crop years in each of the ten counties represented at the July 10th meeting.

The Duplin County Farmers Home Administration Office is located in the Agricultural Building in Kenansville. J.M. Mills, Jr. is County Supervisor.
