NEW INDUSTRY IN ROSE HILL

Instant wall plaques and picture frames, decoupage, flocked fabric designs, hand printed wall paper, magnetic car signs, antiqued jewel chests. These are some of the products of Heritage Design Service of Rose Hill. And these are others. The fascinating story is now being told in print for the very first time. Creating designs that sell in Honolulu, Seattle and Ontario, Canada (to say nothing of Memphis, New York and New Orleans) is something of an achievement in itself. Executing them in unique new materials only months away from the inventor's chemical laboratory is quite another. The firm holds patents of its own and is licensed to use those of others which enable it to change liquids into solids of an infinite variety of three dimensional forms. Rigid plastic sheets instantly become pliable in machinery built in the plant to assume another three dimensional rigid form at the push of a button or the pull of a lever. Electrostatic equipment creates magnetic fields causing rayon flock to travel upward in defiance of gravity to align itself perfectly on three dimensional plastic shapes, making it look as though it were covered with a fine quality of plush or velvet, held permanently

in place with transparent adhesive sprayed on the substrate. To make a uniquely decorated, hand-carved picture frame, workmen first run conventional wood molding through an electric molder. It is then mitered and joined in the usual way. After that a plastic sheet is heated and pulled snugly down over the frame in a vacuum forming machine. When the heat is removed the plastic becomes rigid again, but as a replica of the wooden frame, even picking up the grain of the wood. This plastic form is then taken off the wooden frame and inverted to form a mold into which plaster of paris is cast and allowed to harden. The plaster casting is then carved in a special design. When completed it is placed in a box and liquid rubber is poured over the carved plaster frame, which in turn becomes solid in a few hours. This becomes the permanent mold into which liquid polyester is cast becoming a solid frame in seven minutes. Duplicates are made and continuous production is thus possible. The polyester frames are then spray painted and antiqued before being fitted with a painting or print chosen from a large selection available to the firm - or one of its own silk screened prints may be used.

Plaques of historical as well as contemporary subjects are produced in the same way. Among these are the seal of the Lords Proprietors of the Province of Carolina, 1663, a fifteen inch disc displaying the coats of arms of the eight noblemen to whom King Charles granted what is now North and South Carolina and the lands between them and "the South Seas (Pacific)". Another interesting plaque has relief from the tomb of Queen Nofretari, c 1250 B. C., which blends beautifully into any modern decor, despite its ancient origin. The firm's work with textiles is done for a New York company which owns mills in Philadelphia and in two North Carolina cities. Designs are hand printed in the silk screen process, in which colored inks and adhesive are forced through a stencil adhered to a special fabric supported in a frame. While the ink and adhesive are still wet, rayon flock (3/4 millimeter lengths of rayon yarn) is deposited over the design electrostatically. When the adhesive dries the flock is held firmly in place and the excess flock is removed, leaving an embroidery-like design that will resist both washing and dry cleaning. Duplin is pleased to welcome its many new industries from other parts of the country. It

Marines Killed Near Chinquapin

Two Marines were found dead early Saturday morning near Chinquapin after the car in which they were riding went out of control and nose-dived into a swampy area near Northeast River. A third Marine was critically injured. The bodies of the two men thrown from the car were identified as Marine Lance Corporal John R. Williams, and Pfc Jack D. Hiddick. Both men were apparently killed instantly. A third Marine identified as Pfc. Peter J. Durham, thrown some distance from the car sustained a possible back and arms injuries. Wm. Buck Promoted

Brigadier General William McGilvery Buck was born in Rowland, N. C., and he presently resides with his wife and daughter at 905 East Hill Street in Warsaw. General Buck is a graduate of Riverside Military Academy in Georgia, the U. S. Army Infantry Officers Candidate School, Advanced Infantry Officers School at Fort Benning, Georgia, and Command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. General Buck began his military career in June 1942 when he enlisted in the U. S. Army for service during World War II. He was commissioned a second lieutenant in January 1943, and he was sent in combat in the Pacific Theater following a three-year tour in the Pacific. He was released from active duty in 1945. He was appointed a Captain in the North Carolina Army National Guard in April 1947 with the 119th Infantry Regiment, 36th Infantry Division. Since that time he has served in various assignments including commanding officer of the 1st Battalion, 119th Infantry.

Elwood Revelle said the fire appeared to have been the work of arsonist and was set in at least four different places in the house. Kerosene tins greeted the firemen who battled the blaze several hours before it was brought under control. The house located on U. S. Highway 117 about one mile south of Warsaw was the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. Allen Porter and their daughter and family Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Allen and son David. Mrs. Porter had accompanied the Allens to Florida on Thursday to enroll David in a college there. The fire was discovered about 3:30 Friday morning by the next door neighbor, James Carr who called the Warsaw Fire Department. They were assisted in bringing the blaze under control by the Fire Department.
