U.D.C. Meets

The James Kanan Chapter United Daughters of the Confederacy met on Jan. 17th in the home of Mrs. Robert West with Mrs. J.A. Pratt, Mrs. Stewart Jones, and Mrs. Forrest Jones as co-hostesses.

The president, Mrs. High Wells, presided. The meeting was opened with the Ritual led by the chaplain, Mrs. Robert West. The pledge to the U.S. flag and salutes to the flag of N.C. and to the flag of the Confederate States of America were led by Mrs. J.A. Pratt. "America the Beautiful" was then sung.

Copies of "The Confederate Currier" the division paper were distributed by Mrs. Wells who also read the message from Mrs. Alton Keith, Division President, in which she stressed the goals for this year: (1) Each chapter to increase its membership by 10 percent; (2) Each chapter to award at least one military cross of honor and one certificate of appreciation; (3) Work more closely with the children of the Confederacy; (4) Consider re-districting some of the present districts; (5) Complete chapter quota for headquarters which is to be held on the newly-acquired lot in Salisbury which is approximately in the center of the state; and (6) Collect all records, diaries, letters, and all pertinent papers connected with Confederate history possible.

Mrs. Wells also announced that the district meeting will be held in Burgaw and that Mrs. Henry L. Stevens, Jr. is giving a new district award which will be a small silver bowl for the best year book.

The next chapter meeting will be held on Feb. 21st rather than Feb. 16th. As has been the custom since this chapter was organized, the program commemorated the birthdays of three great southern leaders who were born in Jan. General Robert E. Lee - Jan. 19th; General Thomas Johnston Jackson - Jan. 21st; Commodore Matthew Fontaine Maury Jan. 14th.

Mrs. Henry L. Stevens, Jr. gave a short sketch on Jackson. Mrs. Faison McGowan, a new member, gave some most interesting facts about Lee, emphasizing the fact that he believed that a task once begun should not be neglected until it was finished. The annual Duplin county 4-H recognition banquet was held Thursday night, January 18, in the Top Room of the Rose Hill restaurant in Rose Hill. It was the second such event sponsored by the Duplin county Board of Commissioners in cooperation with the Agricultural Extension service to recognize outstanding 4-H'ers in the county.

Nearly 100 4-H'ers who were first-place winners in a county contest, event, or project work during 1972 attended the banquet. These 4-H'ers, who received awards from local businessmen and individuals last year, represented approximately 2,500 youngsters involved in 4-H youth programs in Duplin about half of which are non-farm.

Duplin Commissioner Gerald Quinn, who presided over the meeting, gave the welcome address. The invocation was said by Kenansville 4-H club member Rosemary Brinson. Marion C. Griffin, agricultural extension agent introduced the guests, and Lois G. Britt, Home Economics extension agent recognized the winners. Commissioner D. J. Fussell saluted the 4-H members for their achievements. Commissioner Emmett E. Kelly introduced the guest speaker, Harold Harrison, N.C. State senator.

Senator Harrison told the group that the Duplin 4-H recognition banquet is the "only one of its kind" in the state. "Duplin county commissioners are the only ones who have seen fit to come forth with a program like this," the senator said. He also added that "Duplin has more and better membership in state (4-H) competition than any other county." Senator Harrison said the commissioners and others working with the Duplin 4-H program "should be commended for this."

The senator told 4-H'ers he was pleased that "4-H members channeled their interest into worthwhile projects." He said the needs of people serve as a source of motivation for the 4-H'ers and added "more and more" 4-H programs are geared to meet modern technology and the needs of our people.

Senator Harrison told the young members they should congratulate their parents for providing motivation and guidance to them in the work as 4-H'ers. He concluded by telling them they "must find what you are looking for, and when you find it, stick with it—that's what a winner is."

Following Senator Harrison's message, awards were presented by Commissioner Quinn, Elizabeth Spicer, member of the Kenansville club and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Spicer received the Junior Girl Award. Miss Spicer is a state winner in the Sewing Demonstration and was named the Most Outstanding Junior girl in the 1972 Star-News 4-H program.

She was also selected as the Most Outstanding Senior Girl in the Star-News contest.

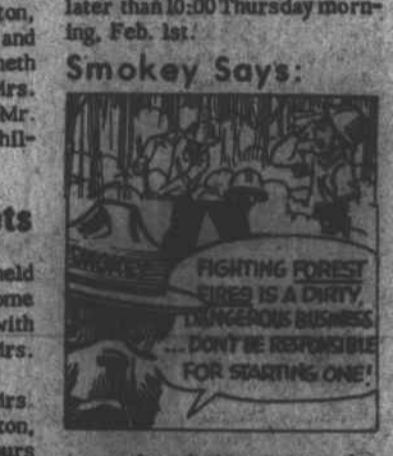
