

The Duplin County Agricultural Extension Advisory Board recently met at The Country Squire Restaurant. Following a buffet luncheon, the meeting was called to order by Ellis Vestal, Advisory Board Chairman. The invocation was given by Snodgrass Wilson, chairman of the last meeting were read and approved. Vestal asked for reports on progress of IMPACT '76. In brief, reports were given as follows:

Vernon H. Reynolds: TOBACCO-Efficiency in tobacco production was emphasized during the past year. Recent practices concerning fertilizer, chemicals, etc., were included in the program. A tobacco meeting was held with approximately 90 people attending.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT - Duplin County participated in the Neuse Area Development Association for the first time in 1973. Several individuals and committees were recognized for their outstanding accomplishments.

ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY - Several citizens of the county recently attended a hearing in Southern Pines to discuss stream reclassification affecting the county. Also, two Extension

agents recently participated in two days training concerning environmental quality.

Snodgrass Wilson: POULTRY - Meat cuts were given to each person present concerning the progress of the poultry industry, income growth, and specific projects relating to poultry production.

Ralph Ketchie: LIVESTOCK - Income from all phases of livestock was reviewed. Ketchie reported that he is putting emphasis on livestock housing and marketing. Rising feed costs were discussed. Performance testing projects were listed as a point of emphasis.

R.E. Wilkins: CORN AND SOYBEANS - The corn and soybean subcommittee charted nine points of emphasis to concentrate on during the past year. Several group meetings have been held with attendance of approximately 90 each time. A project involving 50 to 100 low-income producers was reviewed.

Marion C. Griffin: 4-H AND YOUTH - The 4-H and Youth Subcommittee has held two meetings to make plans and evaluate program efforts. The committee was recognized and Griffin reviewed the points of emphasis that have been con-

tinued on.

Lisa G. Smith: 4-H AND YOUTH - During the past year, the 4-H and Youth Program has reached approximately 3,500 youth in its various segments. This includes a special camp for 100 disadvantaged boys and girls. Work with volunteer leaders and mothers was cited as two of the more successful points of the program.

Maehi, Spioer: HOUSING - Two of the main programs worked on during the year were making house plans available and helping people understand the problems involved in wood rot.

CLOTHING - Mrs. Spioer reported that she had received training in construction of men's jackets and showed an example of what she will plan to teach homemakers.

MANAGEMENT - Program has been given to various clubs in the county concerning keeping "The Family's Important Papers."

Judy H. Wallace: FAMILY RELATIONS - Target audience chosen was the young adult with emphasis on family communication. A Senior Citizens Fun Day was held in cooperation with 4-Hers.

NUTRITION - A program on Party-Fare reached approximately 800 people. The EFNEP program continues to progress and reach many low-income families with nutrition information.

Zennie J. Quinn: CUCUMBERS - A meeting on cucumber production was held with approximately 125 people attending.

BLUEBERRIES - Special demonstration on insect control was held.

GRAPES - Pruning demonstration and a chemical control

program was presented.

LAURENCE: Three weeks after meeting with the extension people with teams last-accepting procedures.

Vestal and P.H. Rainey complimented the Extension staff on the accomplishments of the program.

The group discussed briefly pending legislation regarding environmental quality.
