The bridegroom, a Navy veteran, is a student and instructor at Central Piedmont Community College.

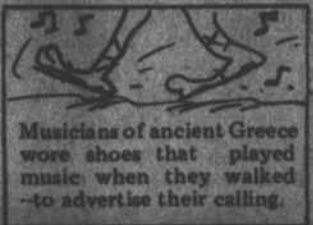
