## Governor's Conference on Bicentennial Planning Attended By Duplinites

Mrs. Wayne Jordan, John and Edith Archibald represented Duplin Co., as participants at the Governor's Conference on Bicentennial Planning held at the Sir Walter Hotel, Virginia Dare Room in Raleigh on Thurs., May 24, 1973. The keynote speakers at the conference were the honorable James E. Holshouser, Gov. of the State of N.C. and Miss Agnes de Mille, niece of Cecil B. DeMille. It was pointed out that the Bicentennial is a nationwide summons to recall the American heritage and to place it in its historical perspective. All groups within society were urged (and will be urged) to re-examine their origins, values, and the meaning of America and to take pride in its accomplishments and its development. Secondly, it was emphasized that all Americans can and should participate in the Bicentennial by programming activities and events to stimulate travel and to encourage every citizen to expand his knowledge of America and to extend a particular welcome to visitors including those from foreign nations. Thirdly, every community, town and county in N.C. (and the entire U.S.) were challenge to undertake at least one principal project which manifests the pride, the priorities and the hopes of that community. The resources and talents of a particular group should be pooled in a constructive effort to demonstrate concern for human

welfare, happiness and freedom. It was further stated that the Bicentennial efforts should and must develop residuals—physical and social residuals that will live long after the Bicentennial has ended. The goal of the Bicentennial is to forge a new national commitment, a new spirit for '76, a spirit which revitalizes the ideals for which the Revolution was fought: a spirit which will unite the nation in purpose and in dedication to the advancement of human welfare as it moves into the third century.
