**Regulation Concerning Dogs in Beulaville**

The Town of Beulaville requests the co-operation of all dog owners in hopes of alleviating a continual problem, to residents, created by stray dogs. In an effort to remedy this situation the Town of Beulaville will begin disposing of stray dogs which do not conform to this ordinance, as stated below.

**REGULATION CONCERNING DOGS.** 1. All dogs found in the Town of Beulaville, N.C. without a collar, labeled with the owner's name, around neck will be disposed of by the Town; 2. All female dogs proud, not cordoned by their owners shall be disposed of by the Town; 3. All dogs which by their viciousness make pedestrian travel of our streets and sidewalks hazardous shall be disposed of by the Town; 4. All dogs shall be vaccinated as provided by law.

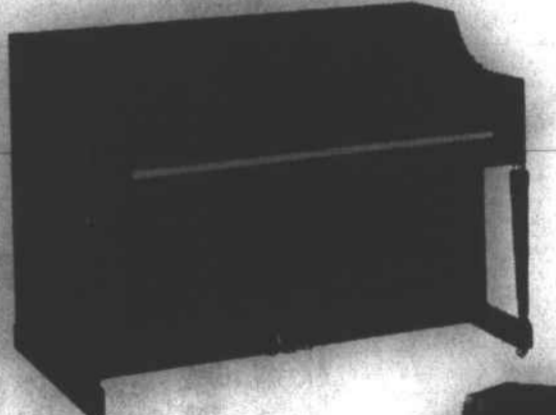

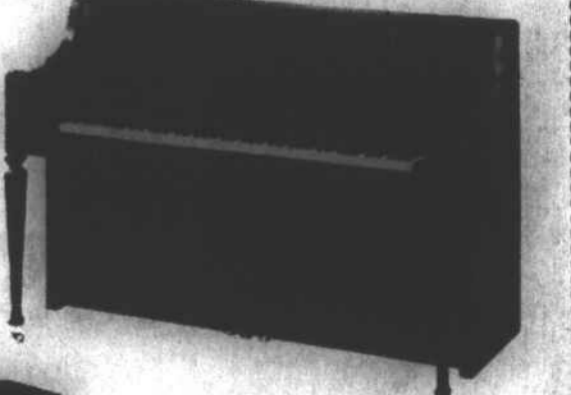
