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Red Cross Holds Meeting

The Annual meeting of the Duplin County Chapter of the American National Red Cross was held in the O. P. Johnson, Education Building in Kenansville, on Thursday afternoon, June 28. The Chapter Chairman, Mr. Preston B. Ralford presided and welcomed those present.

The opening prayer was made by the Rev. Troy D. Mullis, pastor of Grove Presbyterian Church after which the Secretary read the minutes of the semi-annual meeting held last January.

Mr. Paul Ingram gave a report for the Treasury. This was followed by a report on Disaster given by Mr. Grady Mercer who stated that the Duplin County Chapter sent \$1,192.26 last summer to help the flood victims. He further reported that they sent \$442.00 this summer to help the tornado victims following the spring disasters.

Mrs. Carl Barbee announced that the Duplin County Chapter had held 21 First Aid Classes during the past twelve months. Eleven of these Classes were Standard and 8 were Advanced. There were also two Multi-Media Classes and a total of 463 certificates were issued.

In the absence of the Water Safety chairman, Mr. Ralford reported on the six swimming classes that were taught last summer and four Life-saving classes when 40 swimming certificates were issued and 29 life-saving certificates. The instructors for these classes were Treva Rouse, Pamela Thomas and Jimmy Kornegay.

The Youth Activities report revealed 57 magazines going to three of the schools and 26 Friendship boxes filled by the E. F. Grady and Kenansville Schools. A homemaking class was taught in the E. E. Smith School according to Mrs. A. T. Outlaw, Home Nursing chairman.
