of Beaulaville presented a program of spiritual music. Roy Allen Lanier of Central, South Carolina, soloist, sang "O Perfect Love," "Whither Thou Goest," and as the introduction the bride sang "The Wedding Prayer." The traditional "Bridal Chorus" by Wagner was used as the processional for the bride. The "Wedding March" by Mendelssohn was used as the recessional.
