Head Start

Child Development Center

The Head Start Child Development Center is both a concept and a community facility. In concept it represents the drawing together of all those resources—family, community and professional—which can contribute to the child's total development. It draws heavily on the professional skills of persons in nutrition, health, education, psychology, social

work and recreation. It recognizes both paid and volunteer non-professionals can make important contributions. Finally the concept emphasizes the family is fundamental to the child's development. Parents play an important role in developing policies, working in the Centers and participating in the program.

As a community facility, the Head Start Center is organized around its classroom and outdoor play areas. It provides a program for health services, parent interviews and counseling, feeding of the children, and meetings of parents and other residents of the community. The space is arranged so as to permit working in small groups or individually with the children.

The success of Head Start depends on the quality of staff working at all levels in the program. The act of employing staff is only the first stage in the commitment of human development. As the Head Start program has matured,

the need to establish a comprehensive Career Development Program has become increasingly apparent. In any program funded by Project Head Start, the teaching assistants must not just run errand, clean, straighten, arrange materials. They must not just perform clerical and nursemaid tasks, and toilet the children. These are all very important and very necessary. Each Head Start program has a systematic, and upgrading of all program assistants and professional alike. Training is provided on a frequent, regularly scheduled basis to get best results.

The value a Head Start Child Development Center can have for a child will depend, in large part, on how much and how well his parents are involved in the program. We know that the way a child grows depends on the help and understanding of his family. But many parents who live in the communities served by Head Start need opportunities to increase their ability to provide this help and understanding.

Each Head Start child receives a complete physical and dental examination, at no cost to the parents. The children are served two meals and snacks. Head Start is designed to serve preschool children from 3-5 years old. INCOME ELIGIBILITY:

At least 90 percent of the children enrolled in each class, must be eligible under the Head Start Fee Schedule. The total income to be used in determining the eligibility of new children in the program is based on the prior calendar year, or the 12 months previous to enrollment, which ever most accurately described the family's need.
