**Heat-Related Illnesses Unnecessary**

Heat stroke and heat exhaustion have caused serious illnesses and even death in high school and college football over the years. And until recently many coaches were operating under misinformation in dealing with the problem.

Evidence indicates that lack of acclimation to extreme heat and humidity prior to intensive workouts is the greatest contributor to heat stroke, whereas lack of salt and of liquid intake increases the likelihood of heat exhaustion. Both problems can be remedied with today's greater awareness of the causes of these illnesses.
