### Town Elections Nov. 6th

Nine Duplin County Municipalities will be holding elections for their town officials on Nov. 6, 1973 and also voting on three statewide referendums. October 12, 1973 at 12:00 Noon is the last time a person may file for the Nov. 6th election. The referendums are as follows: (1) Public School Facilities Bonds of 1973-8 million dollars (2) Clean water bond Act of 1971 and Amendment (3) Liquor by the Drink. As of press time the following persons had filed for office in the nine municipalities: KENANSVILLE-To be open for election, Mayor (4 yrs.); 2 Town Commissioners Douglas Clark for commissioner; John P. Archibald for Mayor; Incumbent Mayor Dixon Hall stated, "I will not file for re-election and will not consider another term as mayor." MAGNOLIA-To be open for election-3 Town Commissioners (4 yrs.) no filing information. ROSE HILL-To be open for election-Mayor (4 yrs); 2 commissioners (4 yrs) Incumbent Mayor Ben L. Harrell and Perry Whaley has filed for mayor Joe Littleton has filed for Town Commissioner. TEACHEY-To be open for election-Mayor; 5 Town Commissioners (2 yrs), no filing information. WALLACE-To be open for election-Mayor (2 yrs); 2 Town Commissioners (4 yrs). Incumbent Mayor Charles C. Farrior filed for re-election. COMMISSIONERS include: Incumbent J.E. Wells, Lloyd J. Boone, Homer M. Boney, Jr., J.D. Teachey, Jr. BEULAVILLE-To be open for election-Mayor (4 yrs); 5 Town Commissioners. At press time the only person filing was Bill Ramsey for Commissioner. CALYPSO-To be open for election-Mayor (2yrs); 5 Town Commissioners. No filing information. FAISON-To be open for election-Mayor; 5 Town Commissioners (2yrs) Wilson King has filed for Mayor with Melvin Rogers and Isham Blank for commissioners. WARSAW-To be open for election-Mayor, 2 Town Commissioners Johnny Powell has filed for mayor with Colon Tew and Thurman Gaskill, Jr for commissioners. The poles will be open from 6:30 p.m. until 7:30 p.m. on November 6th Registrations however will be closed at 6 p.m. on October 6th. In order to vote a person must be registered in both town and county. The November 6th election will be held under the 169-202 Non Partisan election system decided by simple plurality. A 1-winner or winners who receive highest number of votes are elected in case of tie the Board of Elections determines by lot. No absentee ballots will be accepted.

## Assigned To Soil & Water Committee

Lonnie E. Thompson, U.S. Soil Conservation Service Engineer, has been assigned to the NC State Soil and Water Conservation Committee to head up a watershed planning party according to S. Grady Lane, Director of the State Committee. Mr. Thompson a Civil Engineer in the SCS River Basin Watershed Staff Office will direct the PL-666 small watershed planning program for the State Committee in his new position. He is being loaned to the State Committee through the Inter-governmental Personnel Act of 1970 in which 40% of his salary is paid by the SCS and 51% from state funds. Lane says, "Thompson will direct the watershed planning party in preparing work plans in some 7 or 8 watersheds where the State Committee has assigned a priority but in which very little or no planning work has been done to date. The State Committee has assigned priority for planning to some 78 watersheds in the state. The most recent are Limestone-Muddy Creek, Duplin County, Newport River, Carteret County, and Tri-Creek in Rowan County." Thompson is a graduate of NCSU, Class of 1933, and has had experience in watershed work throughout the State.

## National Employ The Handicapped Week To Be October 7-13

"The twenty-ninth annual observance of National Employ the Handicapped Week, scheduled for October 7-13, 1973, will again highlight our year-round responsibility for assisting the handicapped to obtain meaningful employment." With those words Mrs. Elizabeth H. Grant, Manager of the Kenansville Office of the N.C. Employment Security Commission, announced this week the attention that is given to handicapped persons and the increased efforts to stimulate public awareness of their problems. Small inconveniences to other citizens prove to be major obstacles to those with various handicaps. Parking spaces, steps in buildings, and even telephones limit their activities considerably. Federal and State laws have gone a long way toward eliminating such obstacles in all new construction and much that is already in existence, but there is still a long way to go. Mrs. Grant

stated that the problems occur in most cases because most people are unaware of the obstacles. "This is the purpose of Employ the Handicapped Week," Mrs. Grant cont. "If we can just make everyone understand how it feels to be handicapped, then they will be more considerate." Several programs have been planned for Duplin County during the week in addition to the publicity provided by the newspapers and radio stations, an essay writing contest has been begun in the schools. These will be judged and prizes will be awarded to the winners. Mrs. Grant noted that there are many people in Duplin County who have some type of handicap. The term handicap is a general one and covers many types of misfortune. It is derived from the old English expression, "hand in cap." This was used in medieval times to describe the practice of a particular game in which the players held money in a hat or cap.

If they violated the rules of the game, they forfeited their money to the other players. This misfortune, hand-in-cap, was somehow expanded to include the loss or impairment of a physical or mental faculty. Webster's Dictionary defines a handicap as "certain conditions imposed on contestants in order to equalize superior and inferior ones." In the game of life, a handicap is a handicap only if the individual allows it to be. There are any number of examples right here in Duplin County. Those who experience some type of set-back and who determine to overcome it are better people for it. Most do not consider themselves to be handicapped. In fact, many lead normal lives just like the rest of us. The purpose of National Employ the Handicapped Week is to create greater interest in the man-made obstacles these people have to face. By so doing, we will be nearing the day when they no longer exist.
