

Top Corn Club Awards For 1973

A Beulaville corn grower was the winner of the top corn club award for 1973. Charlie Hill was presented the coveted FCX trophy for edging out all contestants with a field of 182 bushels per acre. The award was made at a banquet setting in the luncheon room of the Kenansville First Baptist Church.

Earlier in the program a capacity audience heard D.G. W. Andrews, District Extension Chairman, briefly pointed out the available resources to aid producers of all crops and livestock to increase efficiency. He also commended the club for its progress and also latest recommended programs over its sixteen year history.

P.E. Ralford, Executive Director of the Duplin County Industrial Commission presented a slide review depicting expanded industrial job opportunities that have come about during the past ten years. Ralford repeatedly referred to the real spirit of cooperation in the attainment of new industry and shared liberally the credit

for industrial achievement with the citizens of Duplin Co. Mr. Ralford was introduced by Ed Dudley Monk, who has served as chairman of the corn club throughout its 16 years.

V.H. Reynolds, County Extension Chairman, noted the rate of progress in the field of agriculture, which should exceed \$100,000,000 gross income in 1978, he said.

The new corn champion will receive two bushels of seed corn for his 1974 crop. In addition to the trophy, second place was won by J.B. Miller of Rt. 1, Warsaw, he will receive one bushel of seed corn and third place was won by Theodore Williams of Rt. 1, Magnolia, a first year contestant. He will receive one half bushel of seed corn for 1974.

The championship trophy was presented by Jimmy Bowen of the Wallace FCX Store and chairman of the extension subcommittee on corn.

The Coastal Production Credit Assoc., Duplin Co. Farm Bureau, and the Waccamaw along with the Wallace Farmers Cooperative Exchange Store sponsored the event.
