Garden Time

Plants Enter Dormancy In Weakened Condition

When you get to the end of your rope, tie a knot in it and hold on. This is good advice to anyone who is "down-in-the-dumps" or trucking down the road toward the sunset of life. Right now, in our neighborhood, this could very well be put thusly: when you get to the end of your rope, tie a knot in it and hold on -- UNTIL IT RAINS. We have had no rainfall of any consequence since the middle of August -- the longest dry spell in my memory.

The soybean yield has been cut at least 25 percent and perhaps more. Corn yields were down and winter seeded grains are having a hard time. Many fields may not make it.

All ornamental trees and shrubs are entering the rest period and dormancy in a dangerously low degree of vitality. This will subject them to winter injury if we have the usual low temperatures. Don't be surprised if we get bark splitting, and other forms of cold injury, on azaleas, camellias, hollies and other ornamentals in the landscape.

ADJUSTMENT

Starting Nov. 1, heating oil dealers can adjust retail prices monthly to reflect the increases in costs of imported and domestic oil. Previously, prices had been under a modified ceiling.

Those who have been lucky enough to have adequate water for plants and turf are fortunate, indeed. I expect that if you struck a match to 90 percent of the lawns in Raleigh they would burn -- mine included.

The N. C. State Fair is over. No rain fell during the nine days, the first time in 14 years. The attendance was up and the dust tremendous, as you can well imagine if you were not there.

I enjoy the horse shows in the outdoor ring. The ring is just a hop-skip-and-jump from the race track. While I was watching the Apalobas put through their paces, Jack Kochman sent one of his "Hell Drivers" around the track at high speed. The dust from that round added to that kicked up by the hoofs of the horses was something to behold. I have never witnessed a London fog but surmise that none could have been any worse than our dust storm.

I have not strayed too far from the usual because I am pointing out again, as I have many times, the importance of water in our daily lives; and how completely dependent we, and our plants, are upon an adequate supply.

Thanksgiving Holiday

CHARLOTTE--Tragedy on North Carolina highways will share the Thanksgiving spotlight with turkey and trimmings, but the N.C. State Motor Club believes that fatalities this year will be less than usual. Club president Thomas B. Watkins says that 22 persons could lose their lives over the four-day holiday weekend. Last year, 27 persons died in traffic accidents during a similar period. The state will count its toll

from 6 p.m. Wednesday, November 21, through midnight Sunday, Nov. 25.

"We are optimistic for several reasons," Watkins said. "In the first place, fatalities are running behind last year's total. Secondly, the energy crisis will result in less traffic and lower speeds. That, of course, cuts down on the potential."

Watkins pointed out that excessive speed was the cause of 2 of 17 accidents where fatalities occurred last year.

In addition to the 22 deaths, the Motor Club has estimated 800 injuries in 1,500 accidents this year over the Thanksgiving weekend.

Watkins urged motorists to continue to use safety precautions in an effort to cut down on highway accidents.

Pharmacy Comments

Physicals: How Often?

According to Dr. Morris N. Flaccus, author of *How to Get Better Medical Care for Less Money*, the idea of an annual checkup may be carrying things a bit far, unless a special medical condition merits such precaution.

By age 50, a healthy person should have had about 17 medical exams. Checkups are particularly important during the prenatal period, at birth, before discharge from the hospital, at six months, again at one year, upon



entering nursery school, kindergarten, primary school, high school, college, and premarriage. Then a medical checkup should be given about 35 and 40, and every two years, thereafter, provided good health continues. Finally after 50, a yearly trip to the doctor may be in order.
