This contribution matches a donation of \$600 made by Reeves Brothers in 1974 when the Park

was first developed. Mayor Judge expressed the appreciation of the citizens to Reeves Brothers for their continued support of the community and their recreation program. Chairman Vinson stated that the addition of this donation brings total contributions for park expansion to over \$8,000.
