**WARSAW SURPRISES
 LAGRANGE AND GIVES
 THEM A SOUND
 25-0 TROUNCING**

 The LaGrange football team did not live up to the expectations of the local fans of this reporter (Wilbur Boney) this past Friday night as the Warsaw Tigers really put a beating on them by the score of 25 to 0. Although the

weather conditions were perfect for passing, neither the Tigers nor LaGrange had any success with this form of attack, and the fact that LaGrange had a very good pass defense probably kept the final score from being any higher than it was, because the Warsaw powerhouse ran the ball for yardage almost at will.

Warsaw's hard-charging line kept the passing attack of LaGrange beat down so

badly that they were able to connect on only one of nine attempted passes, and that was barely caught before the receiver was nailed hard and the pass only went for five yards. Three of LaGrange's nine attempted passes were intercepted by the alert secondary of Warsaw. Fullback Hughie Lewis intercepted the first time on the LaGrange 10-yard line and ran it back 20 yards to set up the Tigers' second touchdown, and from there flashy halfback Gerald Jones scored. Halfback Bill Carlton, who did such a fine job of substitute quarterback again last week at Beulaville, intercepted the second time for Warsaw and returned it deep into LaGrange territory from where Hughie Lewis' powerful running plus two penalties gave the Tigers still another score, a sneak by Smith from the one.

Warsaw's first TD came on a sudden break-away run by HB Gerald Jones as he raced from the Tiger's own 41-yard line to TD which covered 59 yards. LaGrange's star punter and quarterback Wayne Dickens kept the Tigers away from scoring-territory several times. He was easily the outstanding offensive star. He also broke up his share of Warsaw's passing game.

According to reports, the unbeaten Warsaw Tigers (3-0) lost the services of several key players in the LaGrange game. Two-way performers J.D. Davis and Fisher Carlton were down

with the first big game of the conference year coming up next week at Smithfield. Quarterback Milton Smith has been in-and-out, but the able Bill Carlton has done a super job, but the feel is for Smith leading the Tigers
