When Carolyn Garrison Outlaw was presented an Honorary Life Membership, the following was part of the presentation: "To know her is to love her." We cannot find a better way to describe Carolyn Garrison Outlaw for her quiet, gentle ways and sweet disposition. We, the Women of Grove Presbyterian Church, are proud to honor her on Mother's Day, May 13, 1979, with an Honorary Life Membership certificate and pin. Carolyn came to Kenansville from Pelzer, S.C. as Home Demonstration Agent

for Duplin County on March 15, 1932. She served until 1933. During the years she was there, she supervised the work of 400 boys and girls who were committed.

She married the late Albert Timothy Outlaw, Engineer of Denton, on July 27, 1932. They raised two fine children, Sarah West who is now Mrs. James Owen Johnson, and A.L. Outlaw, Jr., a teacher in Bristol, Va. They each have two children, so Carolyn is a proud grandmother of four.

Carolyn taught Home Economics after she gave up Home Diet work in the following schools of Duplin County before her retirement: Kenansville, Chinquaspin, B.F. Grady, and later at James Kenan after Warsaw, Magnolia and Kenansville became consolidated.

Since her retirement, she has been one of the two curators at Liberty Hall (The Kenan Home) which was restored and opened in May 1968.

While teaching school, she also was a Red Cross First Aid Instructor and a Home Nursing Instructor. She is still a volunteer worker for the Duplin County Red Cross Chapter. Carolyn also helped on the Girl Scout Troop Committee for about ten years and she has served on the town's Beautification Committee.

She transferred her church membership from the Baptist Church to Grove Presbyterian Church on December

18, 1978. With all her many talents and home duties she did not neglect her church.

While her children were small, she helped in the nursery and kindergarten departments of Grove Presbyterian Sunday School. She has served twice as president of the Women of the Church, in 1961-62 and again in 1968-69. She was president for about 10 years, 1959-1960. In the meantime she has been Chairman of Personal Faith and Family Life, also Chairman of Leadership Resources.

She has served on many other committees. She was chairman of Circle #1 in 1965 and '66, and serves that circle now as chairperson, and has since 1975. Therefore, we recognize her for her services, thoughtfulness, and concern for others in her church and community.
