B.F. Grady Science Fair

B.F. Grady Elementary School held its annual Science Fair recently. The projects were arranged into four categories: The Atmosphere, Earth Science, Energy, and Life Science. There were also some group projects. RaeLene Young won first place in The Atmosphere category with her transparencies and recorded account of precipitation. Lisa Kelly won second place with her display of the hydrologic cycle and Mike Lindsay and Faye Kornegay tied for third with displays of convection currents and a psychrometer, respectively.

Eugene Sutton captured first in the Earth Science category with his erupting volcano. Barbara Martin won second with her model showing the earth's interior and Ginger Lewis' plate tectonics won third.

The Energy category was won by Camile Grady, nuclear energy; Laura Smith, nuclear fission; and Kim Smith, light, first, second and third respectively.

The Life Science first went to Candace Gross, greenhouse effect; second to Bonnie Hafel, greenhouse effect; and third to Toni Garner, insects.

The group projects winning honorable mention were Life Cycle of a Pine Tree, Bean Sprout Snacks, and

Permeability of a Membrane.

The judges were Dr. Alice S. Scott, assistant superintendent; L.B. Stevens, a retired educator; and Gene Outlaw, an educator and swine producer.

Mrs. Hazel Kornegay, science teacher for the junior high students, concurred with the judges that the fair

was one of very good quality.

Pink Hill Liberty Festival Liberty Run

A 10 Kilometer (6.2 miles) run, plus a 2 mile fun run will be held during the Liberty Festival at Pink Hill, on Saturday, June 28. Scheduled at 8:30 a.m. is the 10 Kilometer Run and at 9 a.m. is the 2 mile Fun Run.

The course is flat, winding its way through the beautiful countryside of Lenoir County. Classes include both male and female in age groups; 16-29, 30-39, 40-49, and 50 up. The two mile Fun Run is for youth up through

age 15 and adults 16 and over.

Awards will be given in all classes. T-shirts will be given to the participants of the 10 Kilometer Run. Split times will be given at 1/2, 3, and 4 1/2 miles. Two water stops are planned enroute.

Entry fees are \$5 for the 10 Kilometer Run and \$2 for the

Fun Runs. Late registration for the 10 Kilometer Run will be \$7. Mail registration should be received by June 20.
