Mrs. Phillips First Runner-Up In Mrs. NC Pageant

The pageant, along with the pageants for South Carolina and Virginia, were held at the Hilton with preliminaries on Tuesday and the finals Wednesday, Feb. 25.

"There were 11 contestants in the North Carolina Pageant," said Mrs. Phillips. "We were judged in an evening gown and swimsuit competition as well as poise, personality and a personal interview."

Mrs. Phillips was the overall winner in the swimsuit competition. She was sponsored by her husband, David, and several Duplin County businesses.

Mrs. Phillips and Mrs. Phelps were awarded trophies. The winner will travel on an expense-paid trip to Las Vegas for national competition.

Mrs. Phillips teaches remedial math at James Kenan High School. She is a member of a garden club in Warsaw. She expressed her

hobbies as tennis and traveling. She is the wife of David Phillips.

During her personal interview, Mrs. Phillips said she was asked about ERA, the competency program, Reagan's economic package and its effect on the educational system, and the priority of parents or the school in teaching sex education.

In swimsuit competition she wore deep purple. Her evening gown, which was designed by a known designer of Miss U.S.A. pageant gowns in Greenville, S.C. was red sequined with a right side leg slit, off-shoulder and one sleeve, with a cut out skin colored material lined with rhinestones.

Mrs. Phillips noted that judging categories for the Mrs. N.C. Pageant have changed for the contemporary woman. Judging, until the '70s, used to comprise of homemakers with competition in flower arranging and table decor, she said. Mrs. Phillips explained that due to lack of interest, the pageant began not only to include homemakers, but career women who were also homemakers.
