Warsaw Budget Approved

The Warsaw town board budget for the 1981-82 fiscal year last week.

A tax rate of 73 cents per \$100 assessed valuation was approved early in June. With each cent of ad valorem tax expected to bring in \$2,900, the property tax will provide \$211,700 of the total budget. The city's assessed valuation is \$28 million.

s50,000 will pay 365 in city property taxes this fall. The new budget is \$64,462

higher than the 1980-81 budget of \$675,000. An increase in water and sewer and garbage fees, expected to bring in \$64,000 will keep the utilities system self-supporting, according to Town Clerk Alfred Herring. The mini-

At the current tax rate, the mum water and sewer rate The sanitation fund was was increased \$3 per month and the garbage fee \$1 per month. The new minimums are \$7 for up to 4,000 gallons of water, \$3.50 for sewerage and \$3 for residential gar-bage collection. Additional water will cost 90 mbs a 1,000 gallons. The s. are fee will be half the water

increased from \$59,015 last year to \$77,300 to provide funds for a new 18-cubic yard garbage truck.

The new budget includes \$65,682 for city administration, compared with \$65,758 for 1980-81; \$158,100 for police, up \$2,655 from the past fiscal year, and \$126,142 for street maintenance, up nearly \$7,000.


