Besides the membership, more than 40 special guests and members of the Taylor family were in attendance for this special event.

Mr. and Mrs. Heber Dalis Taylor, who have shown their devotion and love for Kenansville United Methodist Church in many ways, transferred their membership to the church in 1961, after

having been charter members of Grace Methodist Church in Clinton.

Thelma Dail Taylor grew up in Duplin County near Mount Olive. Her family was active in the Calypso Methodist Church, and at an early age she joined that church. Her school days were spent at Calypso High School. She graduated from Appalachian State University receiving a Masters in social work from UNC-CH. For 21 years she taught. For 20 years before retirement, she was in social welfare, the last years spent as director of the Social Services Department of Duplin County.

Heber Dalis Taylor was born in Beaufort County near Union Free Will Baptist Church. His father was a member of that church and his mother of Providence Methodist Church. The children were brought up to attend Sunday school. Mr. Taylor's parents are buried in Providence church cemetery. After graduating from Piedmont Boarding School, Mr. Taylor attended a junior college. Later he finished his formal education at King's Business College in Raleigh. He served in World War I with one year and eleven months spent overseas. Principal among the campaigns in which he was involved were those of Chau-teau-Thierry and the breaking of the Hindenburg Line. After Nov. 11, 1918, he worked in the U.S. Post Office in Aux-Les-Daims, France. When he returned home, he held positions with the Railway Mail Service, the Washington, D.C. Post Office and the shipyard at Newport News, Va. He later worked in sheet metal and air conditioning until his retirement. Mr. Taylor's first wife, Lucy Bell Loyd of Norlena, passed away in 1950. To this union were born two children - Margeurite (Mrs. Eldon Brown) and Eugene William Taylor.

In January 1951, Thelma Dail and Heber Taylor were married and moved to Duplin County in May of that year. For a while they resided in Clinton and were active members of Grace Methodist Church. When they moved to Kenansville in 1961, they transferred their membership to Kenansville United Methodist Church. Since then they have given years of love and devotion to our Lord and His church. The community has felt the impact of their friendship, too.
