UNC-W Courses Offered At JSTC

Twelve UNC-Wilmington courses will be offered at James Sprunt Technical College this summer. These courses are offered through the recently renewed contractual agreement between UNC-W and JSTC, according to Drew Rowe, director of general education. Students attending other colleges and universities may also have these courses approved for transfer credit.

Four courses will be taught in a special six-week summer session from June 29 through August 6. These courses are MUS 115: Survey of Music Literature, HIS 232: U.S. History Since 1865, ENG 219: Twentieth Century Fiction, and Soc 205: Human Societies. Classes will meet two hours per day, Monday through Friday. These courses have also been approved for teacher renewal credit by the Duplin County public schools.

Eight courses will be taught in the regular 11-week summer session from June

29 through Sept. 25. They are: PSY 145: Psychology Applied to Human Life, taught Monday and Wednesday nights from 7:30-9:45. Classes offered daily will be ENG 101: Composition I, ENG 105: Composition II, SOC 105: Introduction to Sociology, BIO 105: Modern Biology, BIO 225: Bacteriology, MAT 111: Precalculus Math, and MAT 101: General College Math.

Enrollment in UNC-W courses at JSTC is open to all adults who have a high school diploma or equivalent, upon completion of JSTC admission procedures. College preparatory classes in English, math, reading and chemistry are also being offered this summer for students who need to improve their academic skills.
