Jobs For Handicapped **Emphasis Next Week**

The Kenansville local Job Service will be actively participating in National Employ the Handicapped Week, Oct. 3-9, according to Job Service Manager Elizabeth Grant.

This year's theme for the week is "Community Challenge," and it relates closely. to the goals of 1982 as the International Year of Disabled Persons.

Sammie Southerland, the Job Service specialist for the handicapped, says that the U.S. Department of Labor sponsors this annual observance to emphasize a continuing dedication of the employment of the handicapped. In its 38th year, NEHW recognizes the value of a national resource — the handicapped worker.

This week is a special means of bringing employment of the handicapped to the attention of the public," Southerland says. "But Job Service encourages emplovers to hire the handicapped each and every week of the year because they are good, reliable workers.

According to statistics from the state's ESC. approximately 6.4 percent of registered applicants are handicapped. In 1982, which ended Aug. 31. state Job Services offices placed 4,577 handicapped individuals in jobs.

"We believe that no worker is handicapped if he is placed in the proper job," Wallace says. "It is our job to fit the person into a job where, by focusing on abilities rather than disabilities, the handicap does not interfere with job per-

"Employment is not based on charity or sympathy. but is the result of good business judgment. Handicapped workers are good workers. Physical impairments can be equated with job impairments," Wallace said.

Handicapped persons de-siring Job Service assistance or employers interested in hiring the handicapped should contact the local Job Service office on Highway 24E in Kenansville.
