



## Ujfalusy-Nethercutt United In Marriage

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.L. Moseley of Kenansville and the late C. Stuart Nethercutt. The groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Humphreys of Orlando, Fla., and the late Gabriel Ujfalusy.

The bride and groom spoke their nuptial vows during a candlelight ceremony before the altar which was accented with an arched candelabrum and two spiral candelabrams. Live greenery, consisting of pine and magnolia, completed the decoration of the altar.

The mothers of the bride and groom entered the sanctuary escorted by their husbands. Prior to being seated, each mother lit one of the trinity candles at the altar. During the ceremony, the bride and groom completed the lighting of the trinity.
