The Duplin County public schools urge parents to register all children who will attend kindergarten for the school year 1983-84.

North Carolina law and the Duplin County Board of Education have established certain entry requirements.

It is necessary to comply with the requirements which are listed: Immunizations: diptheria, tetanus, whooping caugh vaccine, polio vaccine, red measles (rubeola) and German measles (rubella). and mumps (recommended but not mandatory. Immunization must be

completed prior to enroll-ment in the fall. Early registration will give time to have all requirements completed. Bring Immunization record. A birth certificate or other


