FEEDING WHEAT TO SWINE

With grain prices for corn around \$4 and wheat around \$3.50, it makes good sense to feed wheat this year, especially if the wheat is discounted because it is contaminated with wild garlic or wild onions.

Except for pigs weighing up to 40 pounds, wheat can replace corn for all or part of the ration on a pound-per-pound basis. Many producers would rather replace only half of the ration with wheat since wheat does not flow well if ground too fine and will plug the feeders. A screen size

of 5/16 - 3/8-inch and reduced hammermill speed will help prevent grinding wheat too fine.

As with all rations, the ingredients need to be tested in order to accurately balance the ration. If the ration is balanced on protein instead of substituting one pound of wheat for one pound of corn, then additional feed grade lysine may be needed.
