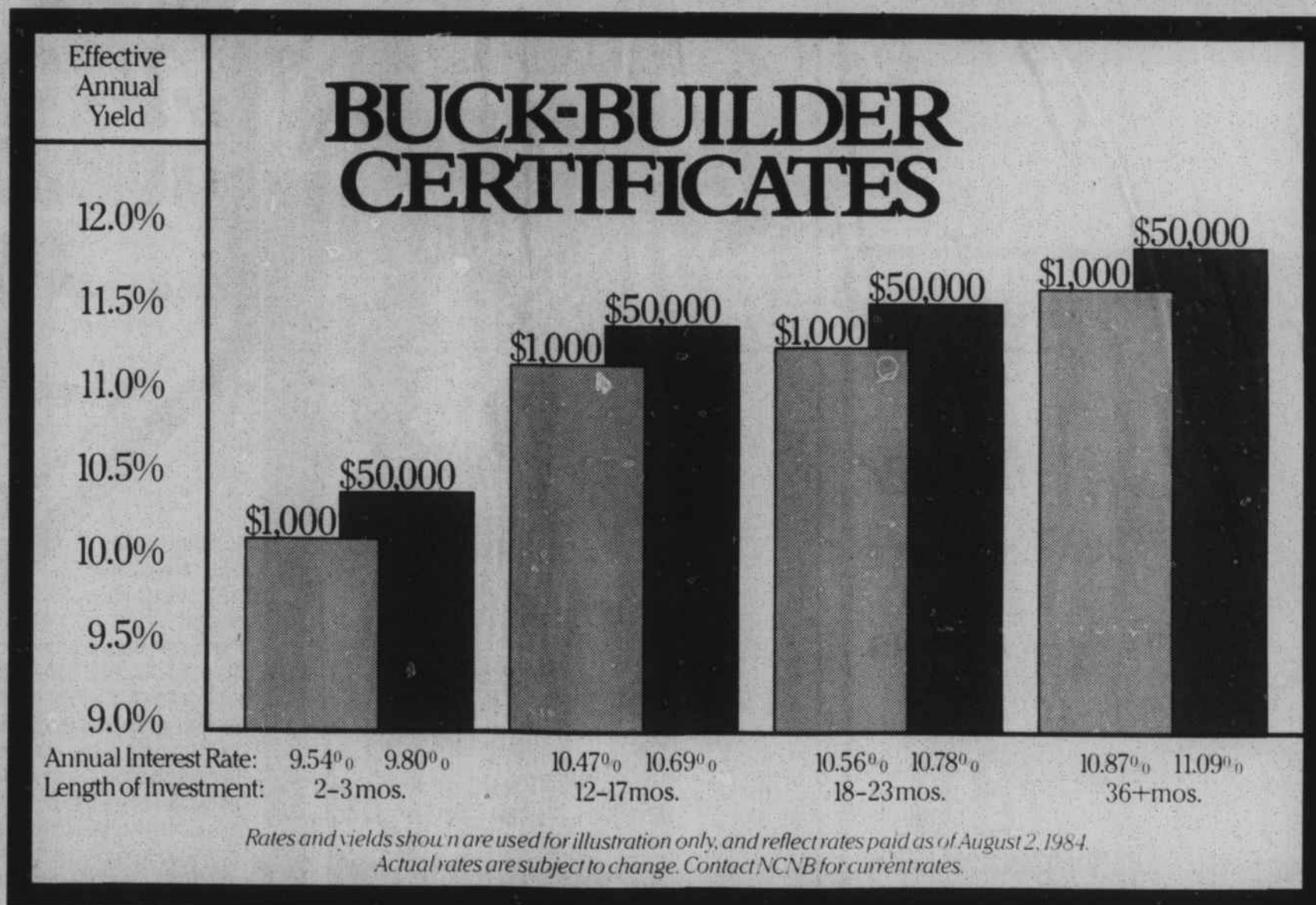
These representatives will have available a variety of brochures, applications, and financial aid information.
