Condensation Inside Windows I hope you haven't noticed condensation inside your windows, but if you have, keep this in mind: That water can cause a problem if it collects on your wooden sills for several seasons.

What can you do about it? Well, you could use a humidifier to reduce humidity to the recommended level for the winter months. By the way, that recommended level is 30 to 40 percent. And this humidity level holds just as true for the kitchen and bathrooms as it does for the rest of the house, so this means your kitchen and bathrooms need to be well ventilated.

Storm windows also help to reduce condensation because they allow the interior glass to stay warmer. But you may still see condensation on the inside of your storm windows or in between the two windows. And that is why all storm windows should have weep-holes at the bottom. If your storm windowns do not have these, drill a couple of 1/4-inch holes outdoors at the base of the window.

If condensation appears between your storm windows, there is an air leak. And, if you see water collecting on the outside window, check for air leaks from inside the house. Chances are you will be able to seal the leaks with weather stripping.
