

Wake Criminal Court.

The January term of Wake County Criminal Court convened Monday, Judge Fred Moore presiding. The following cases have been disposed of:

Ada Williams and Nettie Johnson, two negro women, were convicted of assault with deadly weapons and sentenced to one year each in the county jail, with privilege to hire out.

Weston Jones submitted and was sentenced to twelve months on the county roads.

William Mitchell submitted to the charge of carrying a concealed weapon and was dismissed on the payment of costs.

James Holderfield, Will Holderfield and Ernest Holderfield submitted to conspiracy against R. A. Seagrave and paid the costs in the case. The same defendants and Seagraves also submitted to the charge of an affray and paid the costs. These are the cases that arose over the summoning of road supervisor, to work the road.

A true bill was found against Raymond D. Bynum, charged with the murder of J. H. Alford in this city.

Before the regular criminal docket was taken up Tuesday morning an order was made granting Mrs. Nana Sasser an absolute divorce from her husband, W. H. Sasser, on the grounds of abandonment and giving her the custody of the child.

A final order was also made in the case of Nannie P. Jones et al. vs. Lucy P. Jones confirming the sale of lands for \$1,500 to W. G. Norwood and directing the distribution of the funds.

Herman Brown entered a plea of guilty of assault with deadly weapon and a fine of \$10 and costs was imposed.

The case of Winnie Norris and Len Weathers for larceny was ordered continued on account of the smallpox cases.

Jim Lowry was found not guilty on an appeal from a magistrate's court and another case pending against him was not pressed by the solicitor.

Lawrence Henry, Sam Henley and Braddock Allen were acquitted of the charge of robbery. The cases were not pressed without going on trial at all.

John Wright, of Fayetteville, entered a plea of guilty of forcible trespass and a fine of \$25 and a sentence of two years in the county jail with the privilege to hire out was imposed.

Herbert Pope was acquitted of the charge of carrying concealed weapon.

S. W. Lowry submitted to the charge of obstructing the road superintendent in the discharge of his duties and was discharged on the payment of the costs. This is the case in which Lowry threatened to shoot Superintendent Allen if he persisted in opening a new road through his land in obedience to an order made by the county commissioners.

James Rogers and Dexter Bobbitt, both colored, were found guilty of stealing a pair of pants from Ike Seligson's store on Wilmington street, and Rogers was found guilty of stealing a pair of pants from J. Rosengarten.

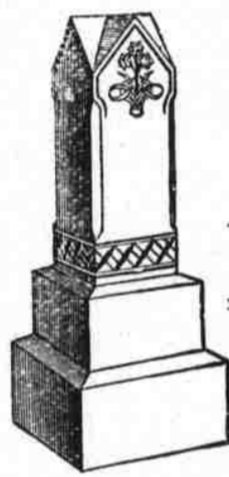
