Work has started on the new bank building at Apex.

The S. A. L. will run an excursion to Norfolk on the 14th of June.

Surveyors are now at work on the survey for the electric line from Raleigh to Durham.

Federal Court will meet in this city June 5th, having been postnoned to that date.

The Hillsboro Street Christian Church Sunday-school picnicked at Fuquay Springs yesterday.

Mr. J. A. Williams, a leading merchant and lumber man at Angier, was in the city Saturday.

The State Insurance Department has moved into the Haywood building, corner of Fayetteville and Morgan streets.

The Vanderbilt estate at Biltmore has sent a dozen fine chrysanthemum plants to be placed in the grounds at the Governor's mansion.

The Glennwood Land Company will ask the city to grade and widen Saunders street for the new car line to be extended along that street.

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Stokes, who died Monday night, was buried at Inwood Church about four miles from the city, Tuesday.

Mr. W. H. Bostwick, the well known brick manufacturer at Banks, was in the city Saturday. He reports a large and growing business.


