Mr. O. M. Minor, Secretary of Pilot Cotton Mills, died at his residence on Oakwood Avenue Sunday night after a brief illness.


Only a few days previous he was Litten on his lip by some insect, probably a mosquito. and blood poison resulted, causing his death.
