John Bridgeman Killed.

John Bridgeman, a brick layer by trade, living near the state line between Tryon and Landrum, last Thursday afternoon climbed one of the steel towers carrying the power and phone lines of the Blue Ridge Power Co., and in some way took hold of one of the wires charged with electricity from the main wires. He was burned on the hand and thrown to the ground, a distance of about thirty feet. His spine was broken in two or three places and the spinal column injured so that he was paralyzed from his

chest downward, two or three ribs were broken and considerably bruised.

He was taken to the Tryon Hospital where he received attention. He died Saturday night.
