New Use for Wood Pulp Waste.

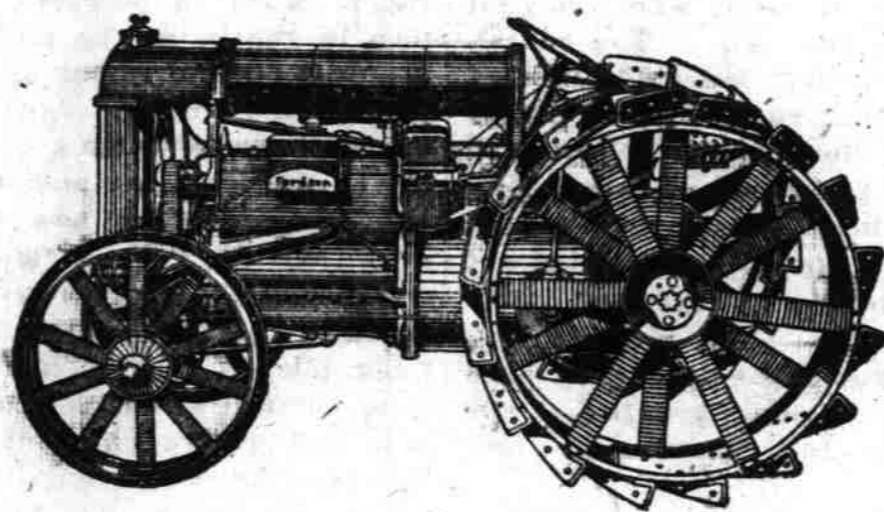
