Western N. C. Chamber of Commerce

The Western North Carolina Chamber of Commerce was organized at the Langren Hotel on March 9th 1921, J. Quince Gilkey of Marion was elected President; T. L. Gwyn of Springdale First Vice-President; J. S. Trotter of Franklin, Second Vice-President; N. Buckner of Asheville Secretary and T. Hi Shipman of Brevard Treasurer.

A director from each of the twenty counties represented in the new organization was elected and four additional directors will be selected in each following a canvass for memberships.

Object of the Western North Carolina Chamber of Commerce is to organize the constructive minds of the progressive citizens to advance the undeveloped resources of this section. Those who will disregard religious, political and sectional affiliations and unite to make the mountains of Western North Carolina the spot on earth in which to live, spiritually, morally, intellectually, physically and financially as well as naturally. 
