Elder W. A. Reed preached at Keisler's Chapel in Rutherford Co., last Sunday.

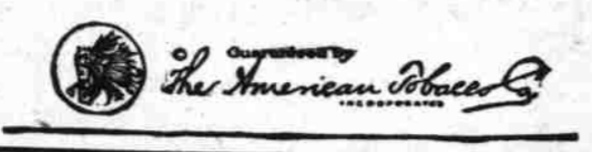
Resolution of Executive Committee.
