We have just learned that Mrs. Carson Hill fell from a mule last week and so injured herself that the Dr. says she cannot leave her couch under six months.

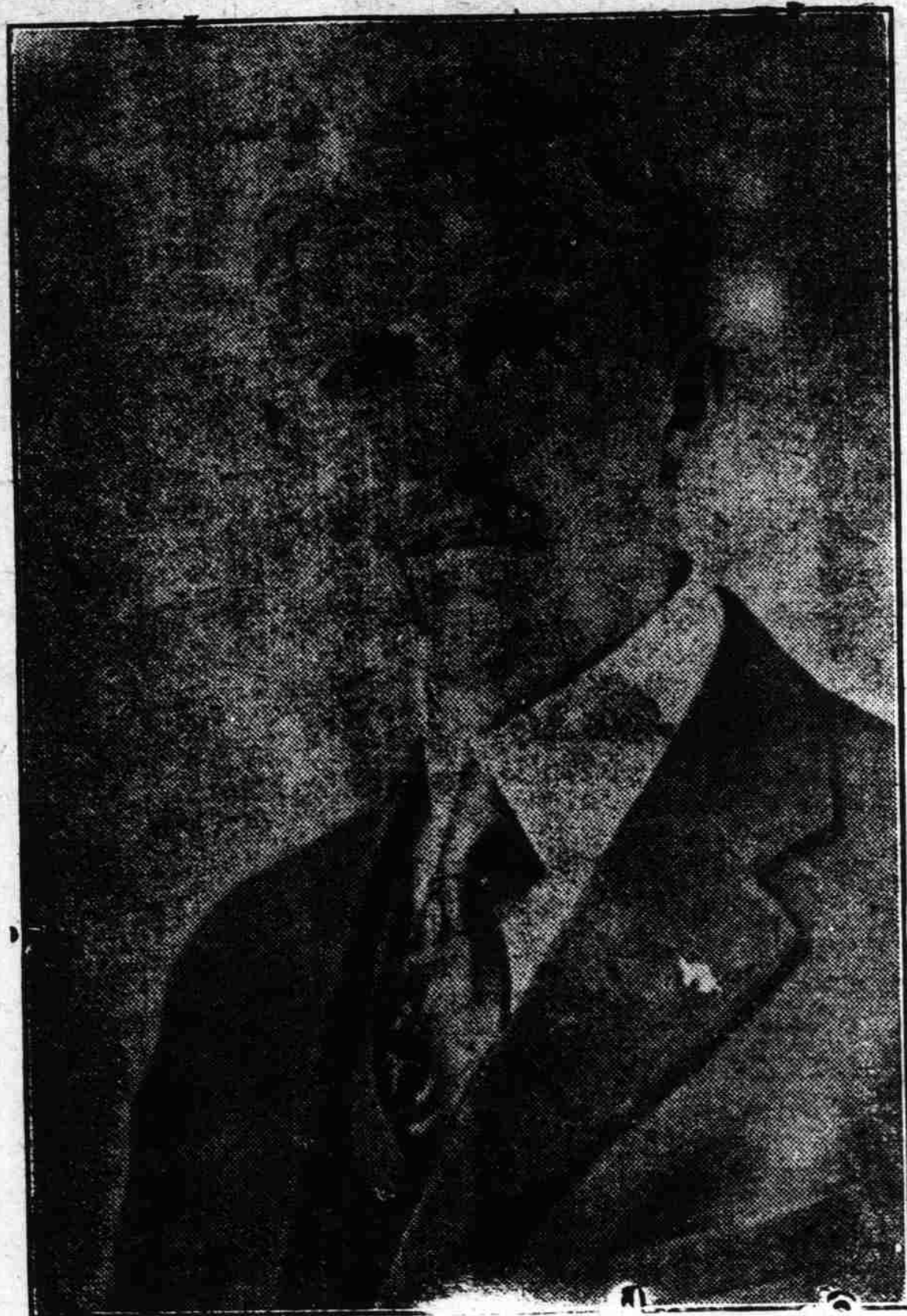
**Columbus.**
