State Sanitary Inspector Here.

Hugh E. Fritz, State Sanitary Inspector with headquarters at Hickory, was in Tryon last week and informs us that owing to the fact that there is a possibility of an extension of pur water and sewerage system that the inspection of the sanitary conditions of our town will be postponed for the present.

He left with us a copy of the law relating to sanitary privies, a portion of which we reproduce.

A Law of the State of North Carolina, Enacted A. D. 1919.

1. "Every residence located within three hundred yards of another residence must have an improved privy of a type approved by the State Board of Health.

Sec. 2. No person shall maintain or use a residence, located within three hundred yards of another residence, that is not provided with sewerage, or with septic tanks approved by the North Carolina State Board of Health, or with a sanitary privy which complies in construction and maintenance with the requirements of this act.

Sec. 4. Every privy located within three hundred yards of the residence of any person other than that of the owner or tenant thereof shall be maintained in a sanitary manner and in accordance with reasonable rules and regulations to be prescribed by the North Carolina State Board of Health and posted in suitable form inside of the privy by an officer of the said Board.

I saw two or three tables and a number of vacant chairs round about in the room and I saw one chair with a man in it and that man was Mr. Dunn. For something less than one hour, J. W. Dunn and I had the most intelligent and important meeting ever held in the town of Saluda. All that was lacking to make it one of the greatest meetings ever held anywhere was the absence of ladies. Not "Nary" mourner was present. So the meeting was organized by electing J. W. Dunn, chairman and J. R. Sams secretary. Many grave questions relative to the best interests of Saluda township and town was discussed with great unanimity of purpose and discussion. On several of the questions there was a tie vote, when of course the chairman would invariably decide in favor of himself and I voting with the minority would move to make it unanimous and this is why there was such great unanimity in the meeting. Then when the meeting adjourned, the audience dispersed, and when I reached the street; I looked first up the street and then down it, and what do you think I saw? I saw and counted 41 men hard at work on a hard time job, which was holding down goods boxes and benches along the sidewalk. Now J. W. Dunn and tables and empty chairs in the Boys' Club Room and the street scene on the street is what I saw, and what I did not see was a single living or dead man or woman at that meeting but J. W. Dunn and myself; but as before stated, it was a "Rip roaring" meeting the proceedings of which I as secretary am giving to the public. Now just why this meeting was so largely attended? and conducted along such enthusiastic lines I am not able to say. Neither can I account for such an outpouring of ladies, unless it was the first great meeting called after the enfranchisement of women, and that they desired to show that women could do things in great meetings.
