Mr. Geo. E. Flow, of Monroe, who was in Polk county recently appraising lands for the Columbia Farm Loan Bank writes to

the Monroe Journal giving his views of our country, and in terms that should make every man, woman and child feel proud that he is a citizen of Polk. We quote from his letter:

"Here, in these valleys and on plateaus, are found the most fertile lands on earth. The farms are the best ordered and cultivated of any I have ever seen. Everything is grown to perfection here that is worth growing. The people are a gentle, intelligent, industrious, law abiding folk. Believe it no more that they are raw, rude and unsophisticated. It is a myth, Aye, more, it is a gratuitous slander. Make it treason, then, to tell it again in Gath or to whisper it in Ascalon.

The Farm Demonstrator here, J. R. Sams, is worth his weight in gold to the people of Polk county. He is a worker, and his office in the court house is some proof of it. There one will find a little museum, showing just what these Polk county lands are capable of doing.

"The people are loud in their praises of the president of the Federal Land Bank, the Hon. David A. Houston. They regard him as being their chief benefactor and, were he to come amongst them, they would open wide their doors and hearts to him and give him a royal reception."
