

**POLK COUNTY NEWS**

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Commenting upon our Board of Trade article in last week's paper, the Spartanburg Journal says:

"A number of the progressive business men of our town have realized for some time the need of a Board of Trade, or similar organization, for the advancement of the various interests of the town. On Saturday last a paper was circulated and signed by every business house, but one, of the town, agreeing to meet on Monday and perfect an organization."—News item from Polk County News, August 12, Tryon, N. C.

It is the same old story, "an oft-told story," and perfectly familiar to every man who has made an unselfish effort to help the community in which he lives. "Every business house, but one?" That's the way it is all over this land; the way it was in Charleston; the way it is in Spartanburg. There are drones in every hive; barnacles on every ship; slackers and grafters in every community. Why they are permitted by a merciful and just providence to exist, we do not understand. But they are "in our midst," as one of the eloquent and ready speakers of this State was accustomed to say when he was doing the agreeable act of welcoming visitors to his town, and the community so infested must "grin and bear" them with Christian resignation and fortitude or find some lawful way of getting rid of them. They do nothing for their neighbors, why should their neighbors do anything for them?

It has been boiled down by the Polk county paper into this form; which is the same as to say that "Every business house; but one" the other business houses working for the advancement of the various interests of the town are to be regarded with no greater

favor by the people of the town than the single slacker who only uses the town for his selfish purposes, if the people of the town do not make their influence felt. The North Carolinians are a resourceful people they are stirred up on any question affecting their rights and the people of Tryon have the opportunity now of showing how to divorce themselves and their town from an undesirable neighbor. It is not necessary that they resort to violence, indeed, violence is the last thing they should think of a more effective method would be for them to pass by on the other side; just to drop the business house that will not help the community as the business house has dropped the community.

Such a policy as this would make Tryon great among the progressive towns of the country and set an example to other towns larger in population but not in spirit, who would be glad to follow; have their business men and people the courage to cut the drones which fatten on the honey the busy bees of the industrial and commercial world gather from day to day. A safe rule for the public-spirited citizen to follow is this: Stand by the man who stands by the town!

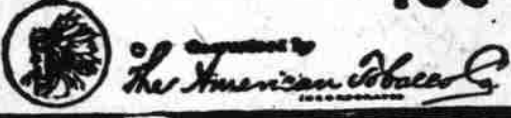

**Oriental Peculiarities.**

Chinese medicine developed a special fondness for fossilized "dragon bones." derived from extinct herbivora. They are also fond of "dragon teeth," as fossilized shells are called. In Shantung, glue is made from asses' skins. In a certain town of that province is a well, the water of which, when drunk by asses, makes their skins especially good for making glue. This glue brings a fancy price, as it is a famous tonic throughout China.

**Irish Language.**

The Gaelic language is the original and historical language of the people of Ireland, though most of that country's inhabitants speak English. Gaelic is now taught in the national schools, Catholic parish schools and colleges in Ireland, as well as at Harvard university, Notre Dame university and the Catholic University of America at Washington. There has been a revival of the use of Gaelic through the efforts of the Society for the Preservation of the Gaelic Language.

**Beeswax Finish.**

To try this method of covering the cracks in furniture soften beeswax until the consistency of putty, then press it into the cracks very firmly, smoothing the surface over with a thin knife. The surrounding wood should then be sandpapered with fine sandpaper, working some of the dust into the beeswax.

**Heart Trouble Not Fatal.**

Heart disease is not the barrier to an active life of usefulness as has always been supposed, said Dr. Frederick Brush to the National Society for the Promotion of Occupational Therapy.
