Just a few words to remind the good friends and patrons of our school that we have only two weeks more before our fall term begins.

Everything is being done to get the building in readiness for opening. The walls have already been colored, the blackboards made over and now other much needed work is being done. **Polk County Sunday School Convention.**

At a meeting of Sunday school leaders of Tryon it was unanimously decided to hold the Polk County Sunday School Convention on September 17-18. Arrangements have been made for the convention to be held in the Congregational church at Tryon.

D. W. Sims, General Superintendent of the North Carolina Sunday School Association, was also present in this meeting, and made many helpful suggestions to the workers as to the best way to advertise and arrange the program for the convention.

Among those present in the meeting were Rev. W. A. Black, P. G. Morris, John Orr, Nelson Jackson, Jr., D. W. Simmons, S. E. Sloan, J. B. Hester.

The following local committee on arrangements was named—Prof. D. W. Simmins, Superintendent Episcopal Sunday school; S. E. Sloan, Superintendent Baptist Sunday school; Nelson Jackson, Jr., Superintendent Congregational Sunday school; P. G. Morris, Superintendent Methodist Sunday school.

Many of the local Sunday school workers will take part on the program. Besides D. W. Sims, the other principal speaker will be Miss Flora Davis, Assistant Superintendent of the North Carolina Sunday School Association. Both Mr. Sims and Miss Davis know the Sunday school work and are recognized as experts.

There will be four sessions of the convention. Saturday night, September 17th, and morning afternoon and night on Sunday, September 18th.

All Sunday school workers of the county are urged to attend as the conventions held under the auspices of the North Carolina Sunday School Association are for workers of all denominations. All sessions are free and open to all.

**Tonsil and Adenoid Clinic at Tryon.**

Beginning Wednesday morning, Aug. thirty-first and continuing for as many days as necessary up to four, the State Board of Health will conduct a Tonsil and Adenoid Clinic for school children, between the ages of six and twelve years inclusive, needing the operation for removal of diseased tonsils and adenoids, at an improvised emergency hospital at Tryon. This hospital will be arranged and the nursing facilities will be under the directions of Miss Birdie Dunn, the State Board of Health School Nurse, who is well known in Polk county, having recently examined more than a thousand school children in this county.

An experienced specialist will do the operating on these children. No child will be operated on until after first being examined by the specialist and found not only needing the operation but in a condition to have the operation safely and successfully done. As many as twenty children per day will be operated on if requesting operation. Every precaution is taken to take thoroughly good care of the children during the operation and afterward. A full force of experienced trained nurses will be present, and every child operated on will be put in a comfortable cot and watched closely until the morning after the operation. The anesthetic will be administered by a capable experienced physician, and every attention possible to assure the safety of the children will be available.

Any parent or guardian of a school child between the ages mentioned above who need this

operation may immediately file an application with Miss Birdie Dunn, Tryon, N. C.

More than twenty of the best specialists in the state of North Carolina have volunteered their services to the State Board of Health for the future conduct of these clinics. Clinics have already been held in forty-four counties. More than three thousand children have been operated on during the past two years. The North Carolina State Medical Society in its recent meeting at Pinehurst endorsed by an overwhelming vote the conduct of this work and the best physicians of the state heartily endorse and commend the clinics.

Every physician in Polk county is hereby cordially invited to attend as much of the clinic as possible. (Signed) G. M. Cooper, M. D., Director. Bureau of Medical Inspection of Schools for the State Board of Health.

Any parent or guardian of a school child between the ages of six and twelve who needs this operation may immediately file an application with Miss Dunn, State School Nurse, Tryon, N. C.

Orphans or children of needy parents will be operated on totally free of charge. Others will be charged a nominal sum sufficient to defray the cost of the clinic.
