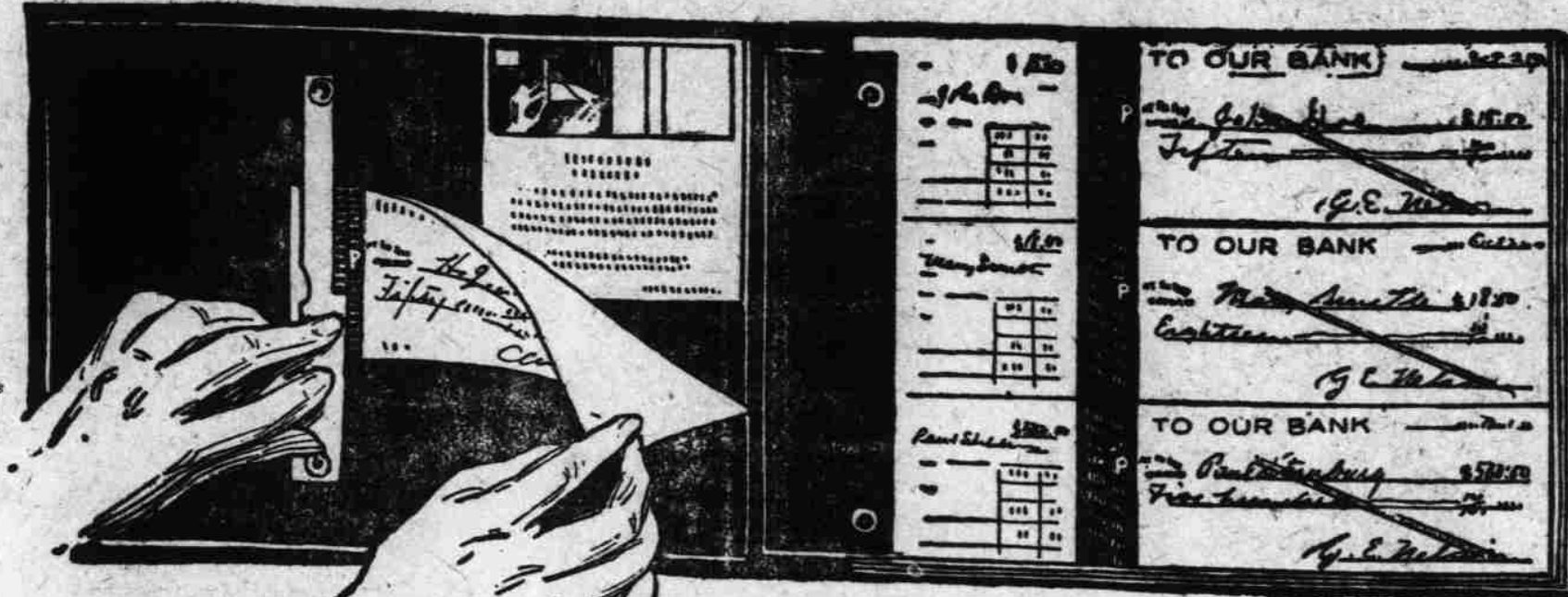


**LOCAL HAPPENINGS**

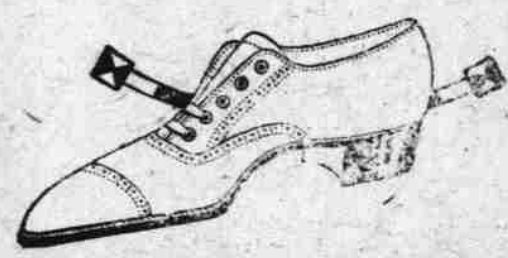
