I am delighted to state that there were no tardies in the High School for October. Our school is showing every sign of improvement EXCEPT a sufficient amount of home study. Oftentimes a large number of pupils come to school without having put the required time in study. A pupil in Third and Fourth Grades should put at least one to two hours on his lesson at home. The Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Grades should devote at least two hours to home-study. High School students ought always to devote two to three hours. Are your children giving this much time? If so, they ought to succeed; if not, they will probably fail. I might further give out this information. Unless a pupil makes an

average of 60 or more his monthly grades, he will not be allowed to go on the next year. I am sure every body will agree with me in thinking this a very wise action. Most of our schools and colleges enforce this law. However, let me add that a great many are falling behind this mark. Again let me urge that the parents look after their children more carefully now while it is not too late.
