A LETTER FROM MAINE

Dixfield, Maine,
Tryon Bee: Tryon N. C.

Will you be so kind as to send me a copy of your paper (Tryon Bee) and will you state in it the price of hard wood fitted for the stove. We have to pay 17 dollars a cord for it here. When I was in Tryon 18 years ago it sold then for 1.75 a cord all fitted. It's from 20 to 30 below zero here half the time and we have to keep roaring fires going all the time or freeze, you that live in a warm climate ought to appreciate it. Coal is 18 dollars a ton and hard to get. We happen to have a wood lot. There must needs be much suffering here this winter. It's my experience here in winter that one can't get much out of life here shut up in the house tending fires. For my part I would rather live in a milder climate. I may come to Tryon again.

EXPERT AID FOR SANDHILL PEACH-GROWERS

To continue the good work done in the sandhills last year, Director P. W. Kilgore announces that R. W. Leiby, of the Division of Entomology, will be stationed among the peach growers of that section again this season to help in developing the best methods for preventing insect damage to the fruit. Mr. Leiby will probably have Aberdeen as his headquarters and will be located at that point after March 10.

Results show that the amount of wormy fruit was reduced from 38 per cent down to about six percent in the harvested peaches by using the proper spraying and dusting methods last year. Mr. Leiby had four blocks of trees in his tests and the experiments were made under actual field conditions. He found also that it pays to pick up the dropped fruit as the increase of peaches free from worms secured by keeping the ground clean would

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more than pay for the work of picking the drops. Another thing of value was the burning off of adjacent waste land. Mr. Leiby decreased the population of curculio about 62 per cent by burning all the scrub trees and waste land adjacent to one side of his test orchards.

Mr. Leiby is one of the leading entomologists of the South, having been recently honored with a Doctors degree from Cornell University because of his scientific investigations with insects and experiments in the sandhills will be watched with much interest all over the State.

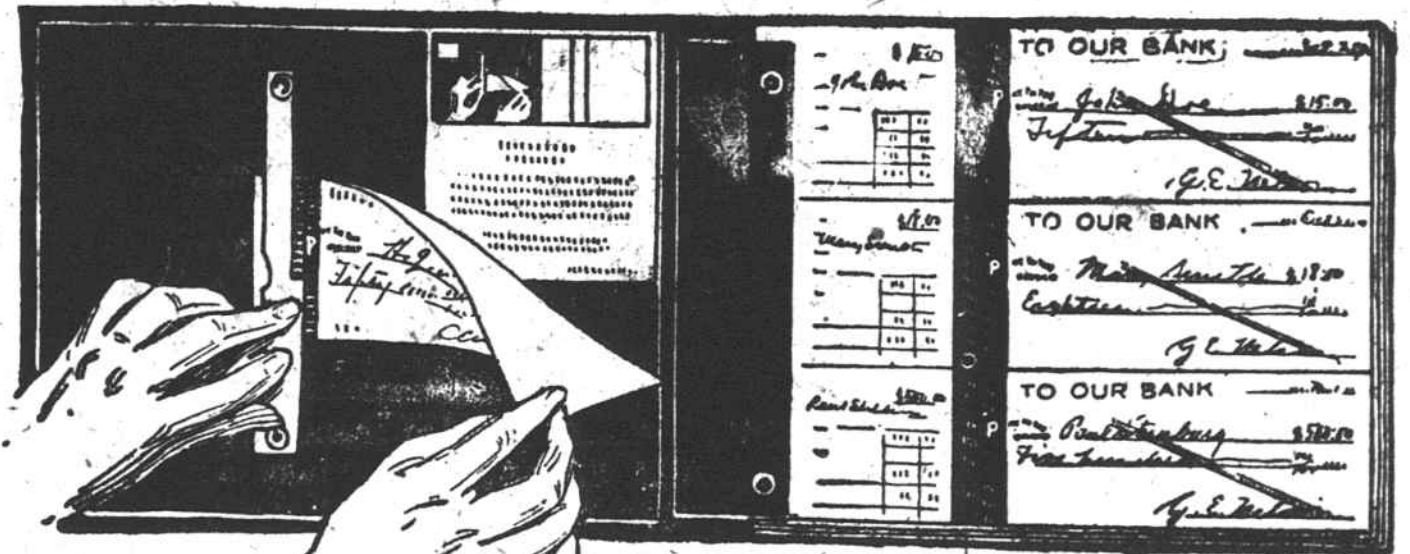

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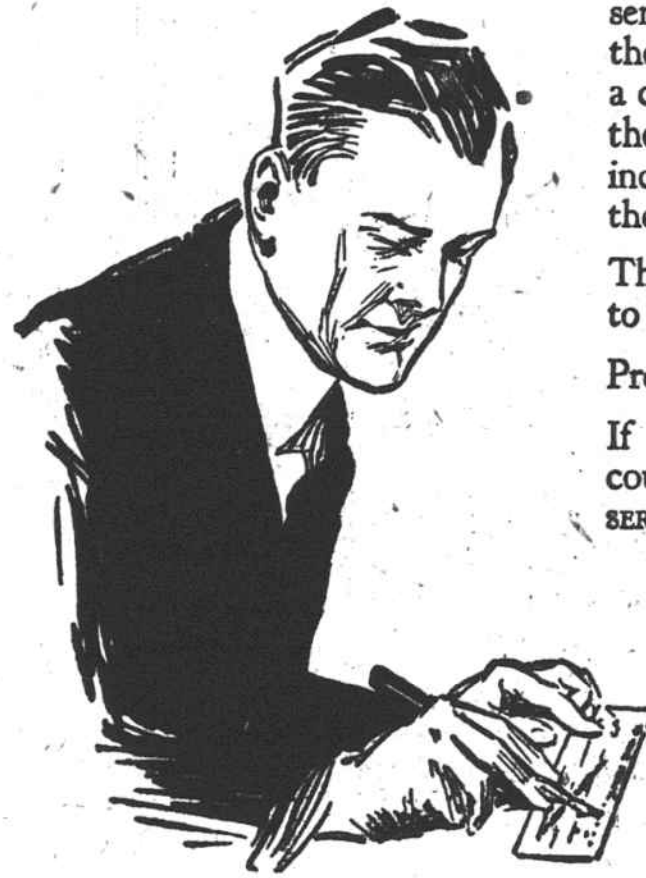
