ASHEVILLE BIDDING FOR NEW JUNIOR ORDER HOME

Inspecting Sites Throughout State for Location of Orphanage

The national council of the Junior Order of the United American Mechanics now in North Carolina visiting various places for the purpose of selecting a suitable site for the location of a National Junior Order branch orphanage, is expected to visit Asheville before completing its work in the state.

Asheville is a bidder for the location of the orphanage and a special committee representing the lodges of the Junior Order now has under consideration several sites which are expected to orier to the national council, it was stated Saturday. The committee expects a visit from the council but it has not yet been determined just when that body will arrive in Asheville.

The council has visited Raleigh and the last place where sites were inspected last week was Reidsville. There the national delegates looked over several locations, in Asheville. Several other points are understood to be in the itinerary of the councillors. Among those in the party are National Councillors Tunison of New York; Vice National Councillor Waters of Pennsylvania; Chairman Cooper of the state committee at Raleigh; and Chairman Noyes of the oders immigration committee at Washington.

Birth And Death Rate Increases In State

Raleigh, Oct. 24-The general death rate in North Carolina increased from 10.5 per 1,000 population in August to 11.5 in September, but the general birth rate of 26.4 per 1,000 population in August was increased in September to even a greater exentent, 34,4, according to the monthly vital statistics report of Dr. F. M. Register, of the State Board of Health, which was made public today.

The deaths, according to the report, numbered 2,500 for the entire State,, while the births for the same period totaled 7,614. Seven hundred and twenty still births were report-

ed. Dr. Register's report showed a decided decrease in the infant deatth rate. The death rate among children under two years of age in August was 3.3 per 1.00 while in September it was 2.7. Diorrhea and enteritis were accredited as the causes of deaths among principal children.
