Greenville Office to Open May First

Early buyers of Lake Lanier property this week are selecting their sites, engineers having nearly completed staking and numbering the Holmes section

It is announced by L. A. and C. M. Eisele, sales directors, that nearly 150 sites have been bought to date. Selling, they say has been delayed some on account of engineering forces being rushed and unable to get sites staked and marked fast enough.

This phase of work, however from now on will go forward with greater dispatch, and on May 1, when the Greenville sales office is opened the Messrs. Eisele believe that during hat month fully 250 sites will be
