Due to the untiring efforts of Mr. W. A. Cannon the faithful secretary and treasurer of the Polk County Soldiers' Memorial Fund, money has been raised and the long dreamed of Soldier's Memorial for Polk County is now in the course of erection. It will be completed and ready for unveiling the Fourth of July. The monument is located in Columbus at the intersection of Main Street which runs in front of the Court House and the State Highway. The base is made of coarse stones and cement, on top of which will be placed the marble statue of an American Soldier. The whole thing when completed will be from fourteen to sixteen feet high. Situated as it is on the new hard surfaced highway from Tryon to Columbus the following inscription which is engraved on the monument is self explanatory.

Tax Penalties

The law requires you to list your personal property for taxation during the month of May.

This year the law will be enforced, and the full penalty exacted from any personal property that can be discovered not listed. Such penalty will cost you almost FIVE TIMES YOUR REGULAR TAX.

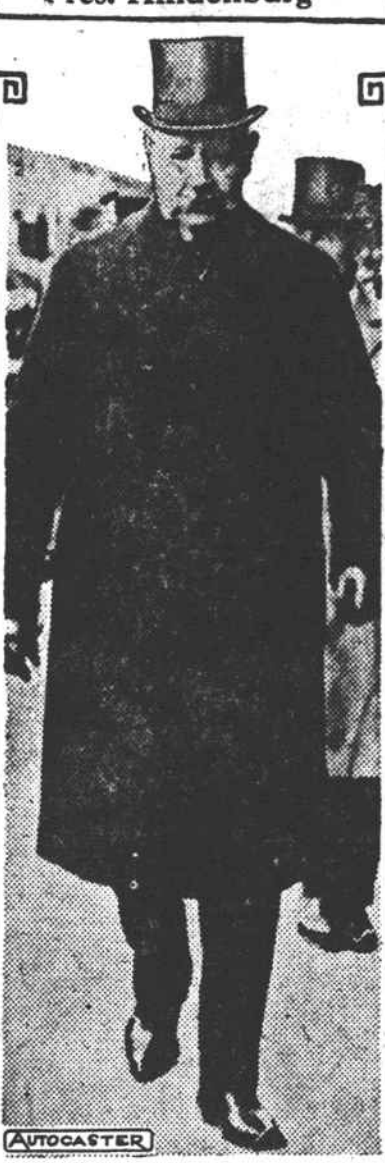
