The main subject of the evening was "Roads," and there were several talks by prominent people, among them H. D. Abbott, C. P. Rogers, E. B. Clou, Mrs. W. T. Lindsey and J. H. Gibbs. A road committee, consisting of F. P. Bacon, C. J. Lynch, B. L. Ballenger, F. W. Blanton, E. C. Barnard, C. P. Rogers, C. O. Herron, G. H. Holmes and G. R. Little, was appointed to push particularly the hard surfacing of the road from the Henderson county line to the South Carolina line.

Mr. J. R. Sams told the club that Polk county has been selected as a banner county in which to develop club work among the boys and girls, and that a special report to push this work would be sent to Polk. He also told us that he had been appointed pasture specialist for this part of the state, and would not be able to be in Polk much of the time, and he introduced Mr. J. Artz, a veteran of the late war, who would succeed him.

The treasurer and secretary both made their annual reports, and the following persons were elected as officers for the coming year:

President, W. S. Green; vice president, J. H. Gibbs; sergeant-at-arms, E. W. S. Cobb; directors, F. P. Bacon, H. H. Carson, E. C. Barnard and F. W. Blanton.

Six persons joined the club that night, and two renewed their membership.
