Two Ten Round Feature Bouts Will Give Boxing Fans Plenty Of Ring Action

GOOD BOXERS PICKED

Tot Wilson, Spike Webb, Battling Barnett and Battling Longmire In Main-Goes

Two ten-round bouts have been scheduled for Friday night when the boxing shows at Kenilworth Hippodrome will get started again. After an absence of several weeks, the promoters have built up a good card and four bouts including two main bouts, are scheduled which should appeal to the taste of all boxing fans.

Tot Wilson of Knoxville, who will meet Spike Webb of Charlotte has a record of 15 knockouts and the promoters feel that this ringman will give a good exhibition. Spike

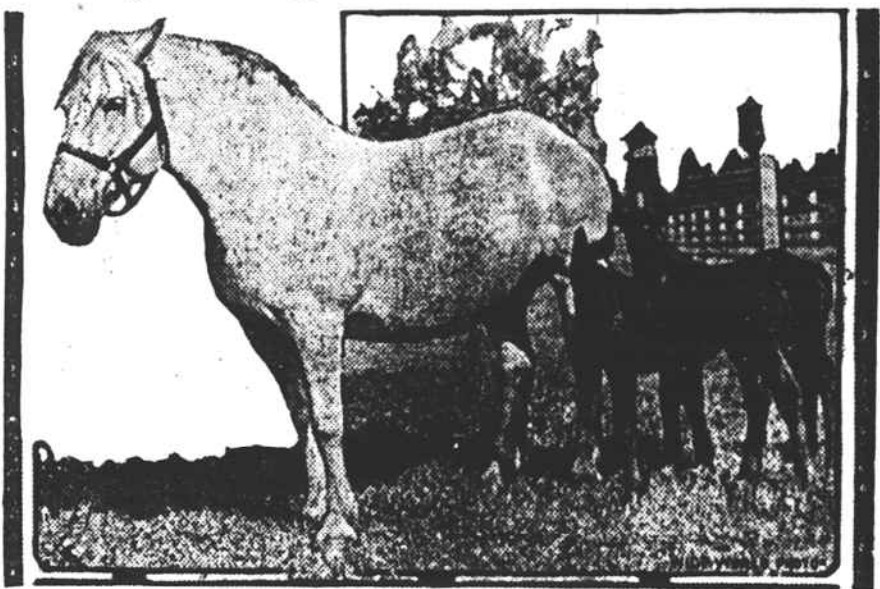
Webb battled at the last show held in the Hippodrome roof and lost a decision to Alex Sims in one of the best bouts of the season. Webb is a rangy, hard hitting boxer, and is a good opponent for the Knoxville flash.

The other star bout will find two lightweights in the ring, Battling Barnes of Atlanta, and Battling Longmire, former army lightweight champion. Barnett fought Trooper Clayton in Atlanta, and won a technical knockout after six rounds of furious fighting. He is said by Trooper to be a boxer with science and skill together with the type that gives plenty of action. Longmire's record in the army is one to be proud of.

In the six-round preliminary Bill Regan will meet John Burton, while the four round starter will be between Bobby Kelly of Greenville, S. C. and Jack Childs of Asheville.

For the battle royal a new scheme is to be introduced. It will be a blindfolded exhibition between five Senegambians. Each is given a sup in one hand while the other is encased in a boxing glove. Down on all fours, the battle royals, beat with the cup and try and beat on some other's head with their gloved hands.
